


Jean Ethridge - Shuswap Branch




Our Adjudicator - Dr Jamie Syer

Now living in Alberta, Dr. JAMIE SYER was Dean of the Victoria Conservatory of Music until 2012. He also served as Head of the Conservatory's Keyboard Department, and taught at the School of Music, University of Victoria. As a lecturer for UVic's Faculty of Continuing Education, he led two arts related travel tours to France. Dr. Syer completed his graduate degrees at the Yale University School of Music as a student of Claude Frank and Ward Davenny. He has taught at universities and colleges in Alberta, Saskatchewan, British Columbia and New Brunswick.



Jamie Syer is the founder of the Victoria Conservatory's Young Artists Collegium program, which continues to offer an enriched curriculum for talented young singers, pianists and instrumentalists. He has performed many times in Europe: in Scotland, Ireland, Hungary, France, and England, as well as closer to home in recital venues across Canada. Last season, he was a featured concerto soloist with the Sidney Classical Orchestra.

Dr. Syer is known for his imaginative recital programming, and his artistic, energetic playing. He is a popular adjudicator and workshop clinician, who enjoys working with teachers' groups and with students of all ages. In addition to his musical activities, Jamie is a skilled letterpress printer, former Manager of his local public library, and Musical Director for a recent production of *Matilda: the Musical*. ✿

Rafael is a 14-year-old pianist, violinist, violist and composer from Mission BC. He started his musical studies and piano at Music Language Studios in Mission at age 4, started studying violin at age 7 and last fall also picked up the viola. He has won many awards (including locally, provincially, nationally and one international prize) for his instrumental virtuosity as well as for his compositions.

He volunteers to help others who can't write music to write down their scores. He has enjoyed attending live performances all his life, and he celebrates the talents of his role models and peers. 

Michael graduated from high school in 2020. His plans for the future include continued music studies at the University of British Columbia, where he will be studying in the Fall.



He started piano lessons a year later and took it up as his primary instrument, dropping violin only to take up the cello as a secondary instrument several years later. He is currently studying piano performance at the UBC School of Music. Braden has been an award winner in many music festivals over the years, including the BC Registered Music Teacher’s Association Piano Festival (South Fraser branch) and the KPU Music Festival. In 2016, 2018, and 2019, he was chosen to represent the KPU Music Festival in the BC Performing Arts Festival at the provincial level. He was a winner of the Fraser Valley Symphony Orchestra’s 2019 Young Artist Solo Competition where he performed a concerto with the Fraser Valley Symphony. To Braden, music is something that everyone should have in their life as it provides exercise for the mind and enjoyment for the soul.

Aside from competitions, Braden plays piano for his church, teaches piano in his home studio, organizes student recitals twice a year, and volunteers at Vancouver General Hospital. Recently, he was involved in the UBC Connecting with Compassion program, which provides music for elderly residents in senior homes. Braden has also been a member of the Fraser Valley Symphony Orchestra as a cellist. Outside of performing, Braden enjoys transcribing and arranging pieces for the piano—mostly from movies, TV shows, and video games—binge reading fantasy books, and writing his own series of adventure-fantasy novels.







who achieves the highest aggregate mark in the Associate Teachers' Diploma. The award consists of a \$125 scholarship and a 1 year free membership in BCRMTA.


This year the Royal Conservatory of Music was the only conservatory who responded.

BCRMTA Pedagogy Award Kathleen Feenstra is a composer and piano and music theory teacher from BC's Fraser Valley where she has been teaching since 2001. Accredited by The Royal Conservatory of Music with an ARCT in Piano Performance (2010) and also an ARCT in Piano Pedagogy (2019), Kathleen is a member of the British Columbia Registered Music Teachers' Association. She enjoys teaching and is passionate about seeing her students succeed in their musical studies.





BCRMTA Student Composer Competition 2020 Adjudicator - Dr. John Burge



Dr. John Burge (b.1961) holds degrees in Composition and Theory from the University of Toronto and the University of British Columbia. He obtained his Associate Diploma of the Royal Conservatory of Music in Piano Performance while still in high school in Calgary. Since 1987 he has been teaching at the recently renamed Dan School of Drama and Music, Queen's University, where he holds the position of Full Professor.

A prolific composer of solo, chamber, choral and orchestral music, he has also composed an opera and finds himself increasingly drawn to music for the theatre. Academic honours include a Queen's University Prize for Excellence in Research in 2013 and, for both his success as a composer and service to the Arts in Canada, he was elected to the Royal Society of Canada in 2014.

A Juno-winning composer with a large number of works for choir and orchestra, his music is regularly performed across Canada and internationally. He is a member of the Red Leaf Pianoworks' composers collective, and a number of his piano compositions can be found on conservatory syllabi.

A passionate advocate for Canadian music, he was a member of the Executive Council of the Canadian League of Composers for fourteen years, holding the position of President from 1998- 2006 and currently sits on the SOCAN Foundation board. Burge enjoys working with young musicians and is in demand as a music festival adjudicator in the areas of piano and composition.





This magazine is highlighting events held in the year 2020.

**Workshop - How to make teaching composition to our students easy and fun.
Workshop was held on February 7, 2020 at Abbotsford Community Music School.**

Led by composer Katya Pine, each 2-hour workshop explains and inspires teachers to think creatively about the repertoire they teach. Katya takes the mystery out of the composing process; illustrating how using the right tools will develop students' musical ideas. Fun and interactive, using recorded and live performance, the workshop encourages teachers to use compositional tools and approaches to stimulate students' imaginations and creativity; resulting in new student compositions. Teachers are taken through a succession of incremental approaches from simple concepts, to more complex musical ideas.

Applicable to all instrumentalists, the workshop is presented using piano repertoire examples. All participants will receive a 16-page handout of Canadian and other modern piano compositions that illustrate repertoire for discovery into compositional thinking.



Katya Pine, Composer

A published composer/arranger, Katya Pine has composed music for production studios, independent films, documentaries, television, musical theatre, opera and the concert stage in a variety of commercial and non-commercial styles, ranging from solo to full orchestral. Her works have been performed in Canada, U.S.A and the U.K. Katya writes extensively for the voice. She is currently composing the opera "More than a Queen", with Vancouver librettist, Felicia Klingenberg.

An affiliate composer of the Canadian Music Centre (CMC), the Association of Canada Women Composers (ACWC), the Screen Composers Guild of Canada (SCGC), BCRMTA and SOCAN, Katya is a recipient of the prestigious Floyd Chalmers Award. Katya received a composition degree from the University of Toronto, with postgraduate studies in London, England and in Calgary Alberta, where she completed the MRU Jazz and Contemporary Music program.






Heritage Fund - Mid Island








Heritage Fund - Coquitlam / Maple Ridge

Coquitlam/Maple Ridge branch had a zoom workshop with neuroscientist Tara Gaertner on “The Science Behind Reading Music”. Learning to read music is one of the most difficult challenges facing music students and Tara investigates the science behind it by starting with a look at our eye movements and what they reveal about how we take in the visual display of music on the page. The visual information is then processed through the Brain, to the visual cortex and into the two major visual processing streams” the “what”stream and the “where/how” stream. She ended the talk by reviewing the pedagogical research on ways to improve students’ sight-reading and gave us some take-home thoughts on practical ways we can help our students better learn to read music.

In spring of 2020, Maestro Clyde Mitchell, conductor and music director of the Lions Gate Sinfonia, invited the North Shore Registered Music Teachers' Association to take part in what is now our fifth collaborative event. This time, however, we made it the largest event yet with seventy-five students participating! We added more opportunities for teachers with students in beginner RCM levels through to ARCT to work with a conductor and concert artist.

We began with auditions in January 2020, where students were then awarded an opportunity to participate in one of the following three events: a masterclass, as a soloist with a string ensemble or as a soloist with the Lions Gate Sinfonia. These events took place from Feb 24-March 7, 2020, featuring pianists, piano ensembles, vocalists, violinists, and woodwind players. Two of our teachers also had their original compositions performed.

Maestro Clyde Mitchell played an enormous role in mentoring, preparing and supporting the students in this musical journey. In addition to conducting the ensembles and soloists, he also composed more than forty eight orchestral arrangements of students' chosen repertoire for this event!

The first of our events was a masterclass where twenty five students performed for Dr. Libby Yu, who was the chosen clinician and concert artist. She was present at each event and rehearsal where she played an integral role in preparing the students for performance. She spent time with each student, giving valuable feedback and useful advice on their chosen piece of study. In addition to this, Dr. Yu worked with each of the string ensemble and orchestral soloists during rehearsals before their respective performances. She expertly gave each student relevant tips on ensemble performance and effective practice tips for now and the future.

The second event, the string ensemble concert featured twenty nine performers. Maestro Mitchell conducted the student soloists and string ensemble of professional musicians from LGS. This concert was very well received and for all the students, it was their first experience with an ensemble and a conductor.

The final concert took place on March 7th at Centennial Theatre. This concert featured twenty-two performers - a vocal trio, a piano trio, a violinist and fifteen pianists performing as soloists


with the Lions Gate Sinfonia. Local piano dealer, Showcase pianos supported this concert by generously providing a Fazioli piano for our students to play. What a fantastic treat for them!

Overall, these events were a big success for our branch, giving plenty of opportunities for our students and teachers to learn, grow as musicians and be part of a community event. It is definitely worth a mention that in order to audition, students had to have submitted a short bio and answer a few questions, one of which was why this would be important to them. Just about every one of the students had some comment about how music is important in their life as a means of expression. As teachers, we could see the impact these types of opportunities have on them and reinforces how impactful our work is. For some students, it's life changing. Their confidence improves, and the sense of pride in their work shines. Many of them sent letters of appreciation to Maestro Clyde Mitchell for the opportunity to play under his direction. One of the most wonderful things was seeing how the students in each group became friends, cheering each other on during rehearsals, reassuring each other backstage and forging new friendships outside of the practice room.

There were also many professional development opportunities for our teachers. Many had not previously prepared students for performance with an orchestra so there was much to learn from choosing repertoire, to clothing choices, stage presence, to teaching students how to be part of an ensemble as the soloist. In addition, having the opportunity to explore repertoire through the orchestral arrangements made by Maestro Mitchell proved an interesting way to learn about stylistic and musical elements in the solo pieces. These are all unique and valued perspectives. We were also pleased that two of our teachers took the opportunity to showcase their own compositions!

Looking back now, we feel fortunate that our event could come to fruition as mid March saw the beginning of the COVID-19 lockdown. We now look forward to a time where this can happen again but for now we treasure these incredible musical memories.



Jarred Dunn, Yamaha Artist and Teacher at McGill University, has presented two workshops via zoom from Montreal for our Branch this fall. This is a rare positive outcome of our COVID-19 world: we are able to bring such world-class artists into our meetings and our studios.

Workshop 1. "Chopin Etudes: Repertoire of Technique"
(Wednesday November 4, 2020)

This workshop explains the Chopin pianistic tradition, including fingerings, technical movements, and interpretations (whether Chopin did or did not approve). The main connection to be explored is the connection between Etudes Op. 10 and Op. 25 as repertoire pieces included in both evaluations and concerts. It is recommended that workshop participants use the National Edition of the Chopin Etudes (J. Ekier) and consult at least two contrasting recordings of the complete cycle of Chopin Etudes (M. Lisak, N. Lugansky, Z. Raubo/T. Shebanova, A. Cortot, V. Lisitsa, J. Lisiecki, B. Berezovsky) including historical pianos and modern pianos.

Workshop 2. "Meddling or Pedalling: Chopin, Debussy, Messiaen"
(Wednesday December 2, 2020)


This workshop examines the types of pedalling that lead to flattering sound effects in Chopin, Debussy, and Messiaen. A link between these three composers is their interest in expanding the possibilities the pianist can hear when interpreting the piano (breathing of singers, chamber music, overtones, etc). We will examine inappropriate pedalling choices and find ways to communicate them to students. Teachers interested in early 20th Century repertoire will enjoy delving into Messiaen's communicative structures. Exploring these pedalling choices transforms lessons into a laboratory of (almost) endless experimentation that deepens comfort on stage and in the studio.

These seminars complemented each other perfectly. Jarred supplied us all with supporting documents to enable and direct our involvement and future learning. He also provided an extensive bibliography for us to pursue on our own. Both these workshops were exceptionally well-attended and we are grateful for this amazing experience for our professional development.

Alexina Louie's virtual release of Take the Dog Sled for Inuit throat singers and ensemble and David McIntyre's composition-in-progress Towns, inspired by the places one drives through on the way to bigger cities. The entire afternoon was an absolute delight, thanks in large part to the truly engaging and generous personalities of our guests.



Heritage Fund - Vernon

On Sunday February 16th Vernon RMTA members were treated to a high level masterclass given by local pianist and teacher Alex MacArthur. Held at the Vernon Community Music School, three advanced students performed works by Beethoven, Chopin, and Rachmaninoff. This important lesson pushed each student beyond their comfort zone in an attempt to find deeper meaning and different tones to match the changing moods. The class began with the powerful performance of Rachmaninoff *Prelude in c# Minor* by Noah Wessells. Mr. MacArthur was quick to delve into both the importance of patience and control with this piece, while pushing Noah for deeper expression and meaning as the piece progressed. As each section was explored, Noah was encouraged to explore different arm weights and voicing so the sound could be more diverse. Craig Matterson followed with the dramatic Chopin *Nocturne in c Minor*. Here MacArthur highlighted the need for restraint and balance when presenting the opening motives. Often a simpler approach to a piece is the correct one! This also leaves room for more rubato and dynamic expansion to follow. Craig was also pushed to create space between bigger intervals so that the listening can feel the distance. As Craig is auditioning to university, these refining points were indeed helpful. Dionne Martyn (pictured with Mr. MacArthur) is an adult student with unfinished business at the piano. Returning to complete her ARCT after a 20 year absence, Dionne played the first movement of the Moonlight Sonata by Beethoven. Again, Mr. MacArthur would not accept a standard interpretation of this often played piece. The lesson began with listening to the dramatic chord progressions used in this piece, and how they can dictate shaping of the phrase. Mr. MacArthur also encouraged Dionne to use the inside triplet figures to help create more drama instead of just floating in the background. Balance, both vertical and horizontal, was also explored to help create a more well-rounded sound. While both teacher and student had different versions of this piece in mind, Dionne was excited by the world of possibilities presented to her.


If changing circumstances demand adaptability and creativity, then the Victoria Branch Canada Music Week®, celebrating our 90th Anniversary year, certainly came up to the mark. Covid-19 did not stop us from having an on-line celebration of Canadian Music.

Canada Music Week® chair, Sylvia Richard, introduced Christine Donkin, this year's adjudicator of the Murray Adaskin Composition Competition and featured composer. Christine then gave an illuminating talk on her approach to becoming a composer and composition teacher with her laissez-fair philosophy in finding one's own path.

Her talk began with seven minutes of recorded excerpts of her non-pedagogy music: *Migration*, from 3 Autumn Scenes, performed by the New Brunswick Symphony, *I Am Here* from Following the Moon Road - poet Lozan Yamolky, performed by the Da Cap Chamber Choir director Leonard Enns and *One Step at a Time is Good Walking* from *The Light that Remains* - based on a book of the same title written by Lyse Champagne and performed by Dr. Elaine Keillor, pianist.

She maintains that not all student composers should have teachers - but teachers are needed when students have questions. The goal of a composing teacher is to keep the student composing. Christine finished her presentation with some examples of her students' compositions.



Canada Music Week®

William Andrews Award - North Island

On November 28th, 2020 the North Island Branch co-hosted a virtual concert with the Edmonton Branch in honour of Canada Music Week®. We feel that this was so successful and enjoyed by the participating students that it opens up multiple avenues of collaboration with other Canadians in the celebration of our Nations' music in future years!

Our Branch featured music composed by Artists hailing from British Columbia, while the Edmonton Branch featured Alberta Composers. All in all, we co-hosted a concert featuring 36 performers ranging in complexity from early beginner to ARCT levels. The Edmonton Branch presented 19 performers, while we in B.C. offered the remaining 17.

In order to adhere to the recommendations of our Provincial Medical officers' all of the students performed on their own pianos in the safety of their homes. Since most, if not all of our students experienced virtual piano lessons since last March, they were all equipped with the necessary technology to accomplish such a 'Zoom' concert.

Although most of the compositions were for piano performance, one young lady from Edmonton delighted us with a clarinet solo composed by Juno award winner D. Ross entitled *Dooti'n Doodily Bonk Bonk*. An Alberta colleague, C. Garritano prepared seven of her students to play Hallowe'en themed pieces which were composed by herself as well as her cousin, K. Puckerin. Kristopher Benoit who hails from the North Island composed and performed his jazzy piece, *621 PM*, so called because of the many ninths inhabiting the composition! We viewed six video performances by students who could not attend on the day of the concert, but who wished to participate nonetheless.



In March, The Branch hosted a masterclass with Alan Crane from the VSO School of Music as clinician. Students performed piano works from levels 8 and up.


The Music Share initiative lead by Vice-President Lorna Yeates continued to raise funds to help assist in the rental of band instruments for school students. Funds raised are audience donations collected by members' students who put on small recitals. By the end of 2020 the amount raised since this initiative began totals \$1765.

The Branch held its Canada Music Week® Recital in November. This year the event was presented virtually, with students submitting their video performances. A total of 34 students participated, and the editing of the videos into a seamless programme was expertly done by Ingrid Fast. The Branch extends congratulations and many thanks to coordinators Ingrid Fast and Karen Wood for their hard work in creating this virtual event which showcased the participating students' achievements very effectively.






as yet) Also, we are encouraging our members to invite their students to enter a composition to a proposed publication titled 'Music in the Time of Covid'.

2020 is a special year we will not forget.

Our branch started the year with great energy and momentum, only to have to entirely change direction and adapt to the new realities of the global pandemic.

We feel extremely fortunate to have been able to complete our two biggest annual projects of the year, The North Shore Music Festival and The Collaboration with the Lions Gate Sinfonia, before the health restrictions were put in place in March.

Pre-Pandemic

The 49th annual North Shore Music Festival was held earlier than usual from February 1 – 14, 2020. This year it offered competitive and non-competitive classes in piano, voice, strings, and guitar.

Despite the early date, classes were full and well-organized. The festival ran smoothly for 8 days, followed by 3 excellent Final Concerts in the second week, one for the non-competitive section, and two for the trophy winners. The audience was treated to many memorable performances.

The adjudicators were: Piano – Michelle Mares, Wayne Weng, Yvette Rowledge; Strings – Calvin Dyck; Vocal – Sheila Christie; Guitar – Itamar Erez.

The 5th Collaboration with Lions Gate Sinfonia (LGS) grew into a mini-festival that included many events over the course of two weeks in February and March 2020.

Seventy-five students applied and auditioned for Clyde Mitchell and Andrea Siradze (the Concertmaster of Sinfonia). Violin, saxophone, flute, piano, and vocal students, including a few ensembles, presented a wide variety of styles and proficiency levels. The youngest participant was 5 years old. Two of our teachers, Marcia Meyer and Serah Strandberg presented their own compositions.

After auditioning over 70 applicants, Maestro Clyde Mitchell invited a group of these young musicians to participate with Lions Gate Sinfonia in one of the orchestra's regular season's concerts. And after listening to all students, he wrote arrangements of their short solo pieces, to be performed with either the LGS orchestra or with a string quartet. This year, Dr. Libby Yu was the Sinfonia piano soloist, who also coached the young performers.

Eighteen performances were selected to perform with Lions Gate Sinfonia on March 7, 2020, at Centennial Theatre in North Vancouver. The young performers had the amazing opportunity to experience the thrill of sharing the stage with professional musicians. In preparation for the big moment, the students participated in a practice recital, a masterclass with Dr. Libby Yu and Maestro Clyde Mitchell, and two rehearsals with the

orchestra. It was amazing to observe the passion for music and the growing camaraderie between the students. All students played with confidence and flair. They truly enjoyed the moment.

All of the students that auditioned were given an opportunity to participate in one of the planned events. Some were invited to take part in one of the two masterclasses that Dr. Libby Yu conducted with warmth and inspiration. Another group of students were invited to play a concert with the Lions Gate String Quartet on March 1. This was also a wonderful opportunity for young musicians to experience being part of a professional ensemble.

The enormous contributions of all volunteers are greatly appreciated, and particularly the efforts of Celine Cassis, who was the main driving force behind planning the branch events, organizing the auditions and programs, choosing the venues, communicating with everyone, and countless other things.

During the Pandemic

After the health orders were announced in March, we quickly had to adjust to the new realities of social distancing. We are very grateful to the Provincial Council for providing timely, extensive, and detailed information on all aspects of government programs and the transition to online teaching activities. Thank you for the great leadership!

The North Shore branch's online GM meetings that followed were mostly centred on helping each other through this difficult period of transition and insecurity. Without the prospect of live events anytime soon, we focused on improving our familiarity with different technologies, the effectiveness of online teaching, and the safety of in-studio teaching. The silver lining is that we will be able to use these newly acquired tools in our future work after the pandemic is over.

Every year we celebrate the best exam results of our students in a dedicated event in November. We still wanted to honour our students and teachers this year again despite the restrictions in place. The day of the event was Sunday, November 29, 2020.

After many deliberations, we decided on a live event using the Zoom platform. Our goal was to have the personalized

experience of a live event but without the unpredictability of online streaming. For that purpose, all participating students sent a high-quality video of their performance to the organizer accompanied by a short bio. The trophies and medals were collected in advance by a family member to be formally given to the student during the event. A few technical rehearsals took place involving the organizers. This was another interesting learning experience.

This year we had 25 student performers and award recipients. Almost all achieved marks above 90 on their exams, including one student who won RCM Gold medal, and another the RCM Scholarship.


Each student was introduced by sharing some of his/her non-musical interests and hobbies. It was interesting to hear that many students have high accomplishments in many areas in addition to music. After the performance video was played, a parent or a relative presented the student the award.

The event was very well received, and the feedback was overwhelmingly positive. The skilful way the MC, Kelly Nobles, communicated with the audience created an atmosphere of warmth and festivity. Thank you to all the teachers who participated in the organization of the event and in preparing their students!

Unfortunately, because of the high level of time commitment of organizing an online event, we had to scale back most of our usual projects, like Sunday recitals and Canada Music Week. We are hopeful that with the new knowledge and experiences acquired over the last year, we will be able to revisit these events in 2021.

Keeping our spirits high, our small, but dedicated **walking group** is still exploring the beautiful North Shore in rain and shine while following the social distancing guidelines.



Rehearsal for Concert with Lions Gate Sinfonia:





Greetings from the Richmond Branch




February Recital

We continue to be mindful of keeping a healthy work/life balance as we teach. Teaching music in this time of COVID-19




2000 - We changed our name to BCRMTA Shuswap Branch. At the September Provincial Council Meeting, Carol Schlosar requested the change and it was accepted.

Several notable musicians have emerged from Salmon Arm. Stephanie Nakagawa has become a professional singer. The Rotary Clubs of Salmon Arm sponsored Stephanie and her accompanist, Jodi Chang, in a recital **March 11, 2012** at the SAGA Public Art Gallery in Salmon Arm, BC, as a fund-raiser for the Shuswap Music Festival.

September 27, 2014, Jaeden Izik-Dzurko represented the Shuswap Branch in the BC Piano Competition and he is well on his way to becoming a concert pianist, as he will complete his music degree at Julliard in New York in due course. Recently he played a concert which was video-taped by the Vancouver Recital Society and is available on Jaeden's website, jaedenizikdzurko.com.

The Shuswap Branch held workshops and masterclasses, sponsored concerts and Canada Music Week® Recitals. At the latter the Branch recognized students who, in the previous year, had completed Grade 8 and up, either RCM or Conservatory Canada, with a book prize or gift certificate. Jean Ethridge, Salmon Arm's very own composer, received her 50-year pin as a BCRMTA/CFMTA member in 2020.

The Shuswap Branch contributed greatly to the success of a concert at the Art Gallery to celebrate Jean's 60th birthday, **January 31, 2003**. Jean gave workshops in composition, and was featured composer at the Canada Music Week® Recital in 2005. Jean was honoured with a "Jean Ethridge Celebration Concert" in Vancouver **October 27, 2017**, given by the BC Region of the Canadian Music Centre. It is a small world, as Stephanie Nakagawa, sang Jean's soprano songs, and soprano arias from her opera, The Ballad of Isabel Gunn, at the concert. The Kamloops Symphony commissioned Jean to orchestrate four of her Elements which were premiered **September 27 and 28, 2019**, in Salmon Arm and in Kamloops.

Our membership participated in many online Zoom presentations:



With little idea of what was to come, 2020 began in the regular fashion with the January Annual General Meeting. This was followed in February by a workshop entitled “Detecting and Preventing Issues Affect Musical Performances” with Registered Massage Therapist and pianist Rachel Shiu; for two hours we moved and stretched to learn how to ease tension in order to play in a more relaxed manner. Our usual “Introductory Alexander Technique Lessons” with Martha Hunter were held in February; these are four subsidized sessions and have been very popular with members wanting to know more about the technique. March started with the “Celebration of Excellence Recital” at the Shadbolt Centre where high achievements in the 2019 exam season were recognized with certificates, medallions, and scholarships. A few days later, the Branch hosted a 4 hour workshop on Dalcroze Eurhythmics with Jared Ballance of Washington State; the afternoon gave us a fascinating glimpse into this innovative method of developing musicianship in students through rhythmic movement, ear-training and improvisation. We were lucky with the timing of the event as Covid restrictions came into effect shortly after and the remainder of our Spring events had to be cancelled including the SPG Festival, the Student Recitals, and a workshop on tempo indications with Dr. Irene Setiawan.

In April, online teaching became the only option to continue running our studios. After the initial shock of going into lock down, the Executive began meeting on Zoom where we formulated how to best help our members adapt. We forwarded information via email as much as possible and then hosted “Virtual Coffee Breaks” in May and June. These turned out to be a great way for teachers to submit questions, exchange ideas on virtual teaching, and just visit with colleagues. In May, auditions for our BC Piano Competition performer were held via video with Allen Reiser adjudicating; Ivy Lin went on to represent the Branch at the Provincial level.

Over the summer, we were surprised to discover that 2020 marked the 100th Anniversary of the Branch! Since then, we have updated the website to reflect this substantial milestone. Additions include: AGM minutes and Financial Statements as far back as possible (1982) on the “Members Only” page; four articles on prominent Branch members on the “Memory Project” page; and a page entitled “Our History” where all

relevant archival material is listed. More will be added to this last page once we have a chance to visit the Provincial Archives in Victoria. A large celebration is being planned for December 2021 at which time we hope to see as many current and past members as possible.

In September, we were extremely fortunate to meet the incomparable Jon Kimura Parker in a zoom interview/ Q&A; his equalling entertaining sister Elizabeth Parker as well as their mother and BCRMTA member, Keiko, were also in attendance. In honour of our 100th anniversary, all Provincial members were invited to join us - it was a wonderful way to launch the teaching year. For October, we met again in a Virtual Coffee Hour. November was another busy month, starting with the Celebration of Excellence Recital; the performances were live on Zoom and the awards as well as certificates were distributed via the teachers afterwards. Next, there was a collaborative workshop with Műzewest presented by Dr. Laszlo Memes of Hungary; his dynamic lecture on teaching rhythm in Baroque pieces was very helpful and we were happy to take advantage of the opportunity. For CMW, the Festival was cancelled and replaced by an afternoon with three Canadian composers: Christine Donkin, Alexina Louie and David L. McIntrye. They each participated in a 60-minute zoom interview where they gave a fascinating glimpse into their process of composition and their thoughts on music. Once again, we invited all BCRMTA members and their students to tune in, the audience was very enthusiastic. In December, we held one last virtual meeting, this time as an evening cocktail hour!

In late 2020, there was much discussion about exam systems. To give our members a broader perspective, a series of six 1 hour presentations was scheduled for early 2021. January was focused on Canadian systems (Conservatory Canada, BC Conservatory of Music, Canadian National Music Conservatory) and February continued with international systems (Associated Board, Trinity College Of Music and London College of Music). It was encouraging to realize how many varied and valuable options exist for our students.



At the direction of the membership at the 2020 AGM, three surveys were sent to members to gather information. The first dealt with the possibility of a “Teachers’ Performance Group”; the response was very positive and the group will likely start meeting in the Fall of 2021. The next survey was on “Policies for Missed Lessons”. Members were interested in developing a suggested Branch policy to support them in their studios and give parents a frame of reference; the results are posted on the “Find a Teacher” page. Finally, there was a survey on the rates members charge for private instrumental/vocal instruction. Using the information from the survey, the Branch Executive decided to create a tiered system of suggested fees that balances years of experience with educational background; this document is posted on the “Members Only” page.

Despite the challenges experienced over the year, the Branch was able to maintain most of our activities, albeit in a modified form. We intend to continue taking advantage of the newly discovered digital/virtual opportunities but in general, we very much look forward to returning to some kind of normal.


Celebrating a Century



Thanks to donations and interest from legacies bequeathed to the Branch we are able to give out a little over \$3000 annually.



To make this 90th Anniversary special, the Branch commissioned Christine to compose a work. She composed a vocal solo with piano accompaniment titled *GRATITUDE*. This work was performed by students of member Charlotte Hale at both our virtual general meeting and at our concert.

After a brief business meeting, Branch President Evelyne-Deschenes Godbold congratulated Monica Tse, Gabrielle Tong and Catharine Kemp-Roth for receiving their 25 year pins and 50 year pin recipient Louise Holland.

Christine Donkin gave an illuminating talk of her approach to becoming a composer and a composition teacher. Included in this talk were portions of three of her orchestral works for our listening enjoyment.

The Canada Music Week[®] concert November 21 featured the compositions of the students who entered the branch Murray Adaskin Composition Competition plus other students who wished to play their compositions. The adjudicator, Christine Donkin, selected winners in the Junior, Senior and Open categories. The winners received gift cards donated by Tom Lee Music. This was followed by virtual performances of two of Christine's Composition The VCM Composition Club (*A Journey Through Canada*), and the Amati Composition Club (*Cupcake Serenade* for 3 violins). The finale was the commissioned work *Gratitude*.

Eulogy for Donna Fishwick

Donna Marie Hauser was born on November 30th, 1938 in Penticton, British Columbia to her parents, Sterling and Evelyn Hauser. Donna grew up on her parents' orchard and farm, which her father managed. Both Sterling and Evelyn were musicians, and Donna soon fell in their footsteps. She started piano lessons at age 3 with Trudy Silvester. Donna was entered in many competitions and was hailed a child prodigy at a tender young age. She continued her music studies and as a teenager, Donna was asked to perform on CBC radio. She also received her A.R.C.T. in piano performance from the RCMT. Donna and Sterling had to take an overnight train to Vancouver every time she had a radio appearance or competition. It was at one of these competitions that Donna was awarded a chance to audition for the Royal College of Music in London, England. Donna's talent perhaps was only equaled by her determination. Upon receiving the invitation to London, Donna took a chance, packed up everything, took a train across Canada, then down to New York, where she boarded the USS United States and sailed to England.

So I mentioned that Donna was determined, what was truly inspiring was that the acceptance to the college was predicated on a successful live audition. Failure at this point was not an option as she literally had no funds to return home. Of course Donna's brilliance shone brightly at her audition and she was accepted with a scholarship.

This would only be the first of many adventures where Donna did not take no as an option. Many of us have spent an evening being regaled by the adventures of Donna. The one that always comes to mind is when Donna rented a car and drove to Southampton to visit friends who were leaving on a ship headed to New York. In those days, you could board the ship for a visit before it set sail. Of course Donna and her friend missed the announcement that the ship was leaving, and when they realized that it was time to go home, the ship was several miles out to sea. Instantly that she could; A..not go to New York as she had to return her rental car, or B..she could not afford the journey. Donna was told that she could return back to port on the Pilot Boat. The challenge was in those days, they did not have access at the water line, and the only thing that stood between Donna and her way back, was a 100 foot rope ladder




climb down the side of a moving ship. Undaunted, Donna and her friend made the climb to the cheers of "GO Canada!!" from the passengers watching on board. When they finally returned to the port, they picked up the car, and crawled back to London in thick pea soup fog. This special adventure was dear to her heart, and we never tired of listening to it.

It was around this time that her soon to be love Keith, was working as a general manager for GB Olivant Import/export company in West Africa. Keith was a friend of the twin sisters that Donna lived with. Keith returned to London on leave, and dropped by the apartment to say hello to the twins. That day, he met Donna. He treated her to a beautiful dinner (so rare for starving student) and Donna decided that Keith was worth a second date. The rest was history.

Donna and Keith were married on July 27th, 1960 at Worksop Abbey in Nottinghamshire. Soon after, Donna received her degree from the Royal College of Music, as well as a Licentiate degree from the Royal Academy of Music.

Donna and Keith decided it was time for a great adventure and they immigrated back to Canada, a few months later, Keith's parents Duncan, Grace and brother Robert also immigrated.

In and around the same time when Donna and Keith were contemplating moving back to Canada, Sterling and Evelyn were living in Whonnock, B.C. Sterling was a salesman at the time, and one day wandered down the driveway of Doreen

and George Skorah, who lived in Burnaby, but owned a summer home in Whonnock. Doreen mentioned that she had 3 daughters, all of whom were studying piano, but they did not have an instrument to practice on over the summer. Sterling invited the girls to use Donna's piano to practice. When Keith and Donna came back to Canada, the two families became instant friends. Donna became a mentor and teacher to Doreen and George's daughters, Penny, Patsy, and Wendy, and it was Doreen who found Donna and Keith a suite to rent close to their home in Burnaby.

Donna began actively teaching piano in the Burnaby neighbourhood. She would drive to people's houses to teach lessons, and she would teach in Doreen's basement. Having gotten acquainted with the Burnaby Heights neighbourhood, Donna and Keith purchased a home on Yale Street, a stone's throw for Doreen and George. As Donna's classes grew, she needed someone to take over the young students. She persuaded Doreen to take the Kelly Kirby teacher's course and thus started a lifelong partnership and friendship.

Donna's mother Evelyn passed away shortly before Marshall was born, so it was Doreen who supported Donna through motherhood of which she was always grateful. Doreen, or Auntie Dodie as she was known to us, became a friend and confidant and sometimes a means to an end. I remember being in Las Vegas with the family, and Donna and Doreen. Some of you may know that the blocks are long in Vegas, and it can get quite hot. Well, Donna had had enough of walking in the heat and she would let us know in no uncertain terms that "Auntie Dodie was tired and needed a taxi back to the hotel". Of course, Doreen was quite fine and would look at Donna with a conspiring smile as the two climbed in the taxi.

Now Having a home Donna set up her studio on Yale Street in Burnaby where she would begin her inspiring career as one of Canada's greatest piano teachers. It was also at Yale Street where Donna and Keith started their family with son Marshall in 1964, daughter Camilla in 1968, and daughter Keitha in 1971.

Donna's successful studio thrived, and she became a much sought after teacher and adjudicator. Donna also became a senior examiner for the Royal Conservatory of Music. She was considered one of their top examiners, and also mentored many young examiners.


Donna built an amazing piano studio with extremely successful students. Many of her students won gold and silver medals for their piano examinations, and won many competitions both locally and internationally. Former students, Sasha Starceвич and Wayne Weng have both received Doctorates in Music. Many of her former students are now successful teachers, and have received bachelor and master degrees from prestigious universities. Of this, Donna was always very proud.

In the early 90's, Donna realized how powerful it was for her young students to experience performing in front of an audience, so Donna founded the Donna Fishwick Young Artists in Recital Society. She toured all over the world with her piano group; including New York, California, several European tours, Egypt, and Musicfest Perugia. Donna was a fan of ensemble music. Her students often write to her and thank her for their experience in the ensemble. It gave the kids a fun side to their music that inspired confidence and pride as well as creating life long friendships within the ensemble.

Donna's children followed in her artistic footsteps; Marshall is a bass guitarist and pianist, Camilla is a gifted ballet dancer and teacher, and Keitha is a classical singer and teacher.

Donna knew that her daughters needed the same foundation in the arts as she did and it was through this pursuit that Donna met Dolores Kirkwood. When Camilla was 3, Donna began looking for "the best" studio for her, it was obvious that the best teacher in the lower mainland was Dolores Kirkwood, an amazing dance instructor. Donna attended Dolores' recital and decided that this was the place that Camilla should go. Another life long friendship ensued between Donna and Dolores. Donna played the piano for the RAD ballet exams and taught piano at Dolores's studio in Nanaimo on the weekends. Donna and Dolores had an amazing friendship with many fun adventures and tales. I had the honour of attending several dance trips to the island and soon discovered it was rarely the kids that had to be supervised but rather Donna and Dolores at the ferry lineup. Unbeknownst to them, everyone in my truck was watching as Donna and Dolores snuck around to the back of their car, opened the trunk, pulled out a bottle of rum and some coke and proceeded to have a little cocktail before noticing all of us laughing hysterically in our car. Of course, they joined in the hilarity.

One day in 1989, Dolores and Donna were having a visit and Donna said "I think we should start a ballet company". Dolores thought this was a great idea, and this was the beginning of the Royal City Youth Ballet. Donna was the president of the society and Dolores was the Artistic Director for over 25 years. The company started with 2 Nutcracker performances at the James Cowan Theatre, and grew to travelling all over the lower mainland with a lavish Nutcracker production, and later, Coppelia, Cinderella, and La Fille Mal Garde. The Ballet company travelled and performed to Disneyland, Disneyworld, and on several Royal Caribbean, and Princess Cruises.

To say that Donna kept herself busy was like saying Mozart could carry a tune. Not being satisfied with teaching full time, running a charitable piano ensemble and prolific dance company, Donna decided to found the Music Man Piano Festival, which would later become The Festival on the Lake. The annual festival continues to take place every year at the Shadbolt Center in Burnaby, and is sponsored by Tom Lee Music and the Steinway society of B.C.

Donna maintained a very high level studio until the very end. She loved her students, and spoke fondly of them with unabashed pride. Teaching was her life's passion; she cherished her relationships with students and their families, both past, and present.

She adored her children, their spouses and her grandchildren; Alisha, Andrew, Madeleine, Tristan and Aurora and was so full of happiness to know that she had just become a great grandmother of a beautiful little boy named Logan.

Donna was a fiercely proud mom and grandmother, always talking about her children's, and grandchildren's accomplishments. Alisha, a hard working brand new mom, Andrew, and incredible hockey player, Madeleine, an amazing singer and Musical theatre performer, Tristans a fantastic musician and snare drummer in the RMM Pipe Band, and Aurora, the most beautiful ballerina. Can you see a theme here?

We were all blessed to have Donna in our lives who would always travel with us all over the world often exhausting us with her passion to see and experience as much as she could while travelling or cruising the oceans.

Donna enjoyed the finer things in life; shopping, travelling, and long lunches and dinners at Le Crocodile, pink champagne, laughter, funny stories, hugs and so much love. Just having friends over and sitting around the table enjoying the warmth and love of her families and friends. Always dressed impeccably adorned with diamond and Miu Miu shoes.

Donna was a brilliant light. But like her memory, that light is inextinguishable. It shines in the successes of her children, the bright futures of her grandchildren and in the music that fills hundreds of households, studios, stages and concert halls. 

Saying goodbye to a celebrated Canadian composer and a dear friend of the Richmond Branch.


