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President's Message

What a difference a year makes! In 2022, we experienced our society transitioning back to the pre-pandemic days: increasingly more in-person gatherings and events were held, smiles emerged from behind masks, and physical hugs were once again exchanged. Music was finally heard not just through our devices but live as we gather once again for concerts, competitions, and music lessons. Such interactions were especially refreshing and welcome after a two-year period of limited opportunities.

BCRMTA continued running its business through our Provincial Council Meetings in April and September. While the April meeting remained online as the council was unsure if we were ready to meet physically, we conducted an in-person meeting in September at Tigh-Na-Mara Resort, Parksville. We established a successful model of the hybrid format during this meeting, which we will surely continue to utilize to encourage maximum participation from council members.

The SoundVision Conference 2022, postponed from 2020, took place from September 16-17 in Tigh-Na-Mara Resort, Parksville, and was a success in more ways than one. It was the first hybrid conference held by BCRMTA, to adapt to the uncertainties created by the global pandemic. As a result, the Conference was well-attended by over 60 live attendees and 30 virtual attendees. The Conference was also the first time the BCRMTA held a live event since the pandemic, providing a much-needed opportunity for our members and fellow colleagues to connect, listen to live music, and develop professionally in-person.

The BC Piano Competition was also held live at the venue; we had the pleasure of hearing five competitors from all over BC. Our adjudicator, Edwin Gnandt, held a masterclass for the semifinalists, and provided constructive feedback to questions raised by the competitors as well as the attendees. Congratulations to North Shore Branch candidate Edward Duan for winning first place in the BCRMTA Piano Competition. He will be representing BC in the CFMTA Piano Competition in 2023.

This year we had the pleasure of recognizing 21 members who received their 25-year pin; these members joined in 1997. Congratulations to all for your dedication to the music teaching profession! Congratulations also to Lydia Yang, a member from the South Fraser Branch, who is the recipient of the 2022 BCRMTA Pedagogy Award for attaining the highest aggregate mark in the Associate Teachers' Diploma from The Royal Conservatory of Music (RCM).

A total of six awards were awarded to aspiring composers for our BC Student Composer Competition in 2022, adjudicated by Canadian composer Ms. Susan Griesdale. Congratulations to Maggie Bai, Thomas Ivanovic, Houtian Zhong and Christopher Elwell for placing 1st in their respective divisions. Do encourage your students to take advantage of this competition to foster their music-writing creativity!

Our BCRMTA students continued to volunteer and provide musical services in their community. A total of 18 Musical Community Service Awards were presented to students this year, with 12 Bronze certificates, three Silver certificates and three Gold certificates. The greatest number of volunteer hours was achieved by Bowen Yuan with an accumulated service of 361 hours! Congratulations to all students--a well-deserved recognition of your continued effort for bringing music to your respective communities.

2022 - 2023 marks the last year of the Heritage Fund Program as the program funds will be fully depleted by April 2023. This initiative, established in 2006, provided our branches \$200.00 yearly with advertising and professional development incentives. A reminder that the Heritage Fund Program is separate from the Professional Development Grant which is still available for branches with fewer than 40 members every two years.

2022 marked an exciting "re-start" of more in-person activities. Moving forward, we are looking forward to the CFMTA 2023 Conference in Edmonton, and our next BCRMTA 2024 Conference in Abbotsford. With all we have learned over the past year and through the pandemic, I am confident that good things are on the horizon for BCRMTA.







BC Piano Competition 2022

Edwin Gnandt, our featured presenter and adjudicator for the Provincial Convention and Piano Competition 2022, has recently re-located to Vancouver Island from Alberta. He has begun teaching at the Victoria Conservatory of Music while continuing with students on-line from farther away. Edwin and his wife see this change as a welcomed new chapter in their lives with many promising possibilities.

It has been over two years of waiting for health restrictions to ease in order to allow our Convention and Competition to emerge as imagined. All is set for us to gather together to reconnect with one another and celebrate our music community.

Fifteen year old Edward Duan was born in Vancouver, Canada and began studying the piano at the age of four. He has won top prizes in numerous local competitions including the Kiwanis, Guild, and Richmond Music Festivals. In the 2018 Vancouver Kiwanis Festival he won first prize in both the Concert Group and Concerto Competition classes and in 2022 he won first prize in 5 different classes. At the 2018 BC Conservatory Music Festival he was awarded a \$400 scholarship for Overall Best Performer. He was the recipient of the Provincial Gold Medal for the highest mark in the Province for both his Grade 8 and Grade 9 Royal Conservatory of Music Piano Exams. In October of 2018 Edward performed with the Vancouver Academy of Music Orchestra in the Orpheum Theatre as winner of their annual concerto competition. Recently, as First Place Winner in the Crescendo International Music Competition in Vancouver, he was awarded a performance in Carnegie Hall's newest venue, Zankel Hall, in New York City.

Her recent achievements include: playing in the finals of the International e-Piano Competition in 2021, the National Gold Medal for the Royal Conservatory of Music Level 10 piano in 2021, Overall Award in the Steinway Competition Canada in 2021, first prize in the Bellagrande International Music Competition in 2020, first prize and the top prize in the Steinway Competition Canada in 2020 and 2019, and second place in the Junior B piano category in the Performing Arts BC in 2019. The same year, Rachel was selected to compete at the Virginia Waring International Piano Competition. In 2018, she won the VAM Orpheum Theater Concerto Competition. BCRMTA Pedagogy Award Lydia Yang

very year BCRMTA gives a Pedagogy Award to the student in each of four conservatories:

- BC Conservatory of Music
- Conservatory Canada
- Royal Conservatory of Music

who achieves the highest aggregate mark in the Associate Teachers' Diploma. The award consists of a \$125 scholarship and a 1 year free membership in BCRMTA.

This year the Royal Conservatory of Music was the only conservatory who responded.

Our Pedagogy Award Winner is Lydia Yang - a member from South Fraser Branch.

Lydia Yang is a pianist and teacher based in the Clayton area in Surrey. She graduated from UBC with a Bachelors of Music. Her persistent passion and love for music motivated her to continue her studies, extending her specialties into piano performance and piano pedagogy, where she has earned the ARCT Piano Performers Diploma (2019) and ARCT Piano Pedagogy Diploma (2022) from the Royal Conservatory of Music of Canada. Her most recent musical accomplishment was being selected as the recipient of the BCRMTA Pedagogy Award for the highest aggregate mark in her pedagogy examination with the Royal Conservatory Music of Canada.

Lydia was born and grew up in Seoul, South Korea, where her love and study of the piano began at age 7. She immigrated to Canada with her family while attending secondary school, where she soon began her teaching career while also continuing her piano studies at the Langley Community School of Music under the instruction of famous pianist and composer, Leslie Janos. She entered UBC after receiving an entrance scholarship two years after first arriving in Canada. At UBC, Lydia received her piano and pedagogy training from the well known and respected educators Miranda Wong, Robert Rogers, David McCoy, and Alice Enn.

Having taught piano and music theory for approximately 20 years, Lydia enjoys working with students of all ages and levels. She is highly specialized in conservatory exam, university audition, and piano competition preparations. Lydia strongly believes in the importance of continuous learning



and works to cultivate within her the virtues of a successful and professional musician. She regularly attends major pedagogical seminars and conferences to enrich her musical knowledge. She also studies under Dr. Libby Yu biweekly to further her professional development as a pianist. As proof of her undying passion, effort, and commitment, her students routinely win awards and scholarships in piano competitions, as well as earn high marks on their conservatory examinations. Many of her students attend highly ranked universities in both the United States and Canada.

For each piece a student learns, Lydia shares and communicates her love of music by exploring and explaining the musical history of both the piece and the composer. She offers well-organized and professional instruction to her students so they may achieve at the highest possible level. Lydia strives to stimulate, nurture, and guide her students into discovering their passion and potential.

Lydia is a member of the Canadian Federation of Music Teacher's Association and the British Columbia Registered Music Teachers' Association (South Fraser Branch) where she currently serves as a secretary. She is also a certified RCM advanced teacher for the disciplines of both piano and harmony/history since 2017. In recent years, Lydia has taken a special interest in coaching young teachers to help them become more qualified and professional musicians. In her spare time, she loves to walk with her dog, take care of her indoor plants, and find books and videos relating to specific topics regarding pedagogical issues.







BCRMTA Student Composer Competition 2022 Adjudicator Susan Griesdale

Susan Griesdale is an award winning Composer, Piano Teacher, Clinician and Adjudicator. Susan studied piano with Elizabeth Pengelly and earned her ARCT from the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto. She studied Composition and Theory with Composers Michael J. Rudman, Julian Miran and Heather Schmidt. She studied Piano Pedagogy with Mrs. Marina Geringas at the Royal Conservatory of Music. Susan is an Associate Composer of the CMC (Canadian Music Center).

Susan has published collections for piano, violin, flute, chamber music for toy pianos and choral works. You will find her violin music in the 2021 RCM Violin Series and her piano music is listed in the 2022 RCM Piano Syllabus, the Conservatory Canada Syllabus as well as the ACNMP's Contemporary Showcase Syllabus. She also has many works published in the Canadian National Conservatory's Northern Lights Publications.

Her award winning Arctic Voices for piano won the CFMTA Call for Compositions in 2011. In 2017 her piano piece The Road Goes On was included in the compilation of winning pieces along with four of her artwork images. And her piece For the Children, for Violin and Piano, won the CFMTA Call for Compositions in 2022. Her piano music has been chosen as required repertoire for Music Festival Composer Classes and is also included in the MusIQ Club – an after school software program developed for schools across the USA and Canada.

As a clinician Susan has performed and presented piano compositions at both National (CFMTA) and Provincial Conventions, the Toronto Chapter of MYC, at the Suzuki Festival in Kingston Ontario, as well as for ORMTA branches throughout Ontario. She also runs Composition Masterclasses for local teachers and their students.

Heritage Fund

This magazine is highlighting events held in the year 2022. Our fiscal year end is February 28. Therefore, we have a cross over from 2 fiscal years. For the Heritage Fund for 2022 / 2023 we used the same project as the 2021 / 2022 project.

2021/2022

The BCRMTA Finance Committee Project for 2020 / 2021 is a Branch Continuing Education Project. This project is supported through the Heritage Fund and will assist branches at the local level to conduct continuing education events/workshops/ masterclasses for their membership and community.

This Subsidy is available to all branches of BCRMTA regardless of size. This Subsidy program is separate from the Professional Development Grant/Bursary available to branches with 40 members or less.

Amount of Subsidy: Up to \$200.00 per branch

Guidelines:

- Applications for the Branch Continuing Education Project must be received BEFORE the event being applied for. A decision on the application will take place before the event.
- 2. The deadline for the 2021/22 Branch Continuing Education Project applications is February 1, 2022
- 3. The event must be complete prior to March 1, 2022
- The \$200.00 subsidy is in addition to any Professional Development Bursary/Grant already approved/being applied for the 2020/2021 fiscal year. The Subsidy may be added on to the Bursary or used for a separate event.
- 5. Application forms are available on our website: www.bcrmta.bc.ca
- Following completion of the approved event, reports and photos (if possible) should be sent to Elizabeth Munro – address located on application form.

The deadline for the Branch Continuing Education Project applications is February 1, 2022.

Presenter - Nicholas Fairbank

Nicholas Fairbank was our featured Canadian composer for both the Murray Adaskin Composition Competition adjudication and for the Breakfast Meeting. His talk entitled "Reflections after Half a Century of Composing" was an inspiration for all.

He divided his talk into six sections: 1. Music and Language 2. Synesthesia 3. Aesthetics 4. Music and Emotion 5. Gestalt in Music 6. Music and Movement

He began with Music and Language which are most definitely linked by using Mandarin, a tonal language, as an example. He also pointed out how different ethnicities tone of music reflects the language, example English vs French vs Spanish. Nicholas shared that when he composes vocal and choral music that it is always the words that come first followed by the music score.

Nicholas referred to Levintin's six categories of music: Friendship, Joy, Comfort, Knowledge, Religion and Love.

Music is connected to dance such as can be found in conducting.

During a half century of composing it is not surprising that much has transformed over the years. Nicholas first started with composing keyboard duets and then string quartets. Church choral music was next to follow. And often an influence was which parts/vocalists were the strongest in the choir. Other influences have been travels to many varied places and even living in different countries.

Nicholas played excerpts from 3 different works:

1. Gare de Montréal (2005)

- a. 35 minutes, 10 continuous movements
- b. Vocal Quintet (SATTB) + 10 Instrumentalists
- c. Written for Nicholas' Masters Degree

d. The work begins in the grand foyer of the Montréal train station and then takes the listener down the escalator & beyond

2. Sea Cantata (2010)

- a. 25 minutes, 7 movements
- b. Children's Choir, Mixed Choir & Orchestra

c. Texts by Robert Service, L.M. Montgomery, Rudyard Kipling & Carl Sandburg

3. Isbjørn! (2012)

a. 20 minutes, 5 movements

b. for 2 choirs (SATB & SSAA), vocal quintet, piano & percussion

c. Written as part of Nicholas' artistic residency in Svalbard

d. Nick played the beautiful 5th movement "Aurora" which is a vocal work without any text to create an impression of the Northern Lights

Workshop with Dr. Jarred Dunn

December 2, 2022

Discussing on the importance/use of an exam system, its pros and cons:

- 1. Look at exams in a critical way
- 2. Getting a 'reward' or a 'piece of paper'
- 3. Sense of accomplishment, moving forward
- For students or parents who insist on an exam in a specific time period – the teacher can get you past the exam but can't guarantee the quality – it either needs more time or more lesson time

Students with small hands:

- 1. Measure their hand, is the comfortable stretch 6th, 7th
- 2. Teach repertoire that has intervals only 1 step larger than what they can reach comfortably, which doesn't drastically force them to open their hand rapidly.
- 3. Match repertoire to scale and other technical requirements
- 4. Assess whether the student is practicing well enough to reach the octave slower octaves, parallel sixths
- 5. Some repertoire uses scales or arpeggiated patterns to fill the larger intervals

Good pieces for students with small hands:

- 1. Scarlatti Sonata in E Major, K 308 (Level 9 2015 edition) 5th the largest interval
- Bach G minor Sinfonia (Level 9 2015 edition) only broken 8th followed by a rest (use Henle edition or Busoni edition)
- 3. Scarlatti Sonata in D minor, K 9 for people who have good scales, has some double thirds

Google the piece: use the best edition, original,

How to test/build musical maturity:

- 1. Play a scale, listen to the beginning and end, the tone quality, evenness, overall arch
- 2. Listen together to music and hear their feedback
- 3. Listen to some competition and ask what might be going on through the head of competitors
- 4. What have they listened to recently, i.e., if they play an Invention, did they listen to the entire set?

- Bring 1 2 questions to the lesson which they discovered in practicing and have difficulty with, self identify their own weaknesses
- 6. The sign of maturity is when the student can decide what repertoire is appropriate for their skill level at the moment
- Practice slowly with them on etudes, examining every movement of the hand, of the finger, any tension; etudes need to be done perfectly by the end of the age 15, if you want to have a pianist
- The problem with playing at speed is that you don't know every detail – play slowly in technical training to develop details
- 9. Be honest but in a constructive, diplomatic way

Some difficult teaching issues:

- 1. Polyrhythms: i.e., playing 4 against 3: mathematical or intuitive ?
 - a. Goal posting or sign posting:
- b. Line up the soprano notes with the main beat bass note (1st Chopin nocturne in Bb minor)
- c. Then add 1 note at time either right or left, creating vertical moments when the hands align
- d. The passage needs to unfold very naturally from the get go
- e. Group them into smallest possible combinations: i.e., 6 against 4, go down to 3 against 2
- f. Play the last 3 Chopin etudes, that nobody usually plays, because they have those problems
- g. learn to count solidly in regular rhythm learn how to subdivide
- h. DON'T use pedal

Pieces presented:

- 1. Nocturne in Eb Major, op 9, #2, Chopin ornamentation
- 2. Nocturne in E minor, op 72, #1, Chopin
- 3. *Sonata in C, Hob XVI 10*, Haydn trills and appoggiaturas begin with the bass
- a. V chords are more dynamically loud than tonic chords
- 4. Consolation #3, Liszt 4 against 3 rhythm

International conferences include Hawaii, Barcelona, Spain, and Venice, Italy. Mr. Gnandt's students have gone on to graduate studies at prestigious institutions such as Julliard School of Music, Manhattan School of Music, Eastman School of Music, Westminster Choir College, McGill University, University of Toronto, and the University of Ottawa.

DAVID DUKE

David Duke will discuss the significant contributions of women composers throughout musical development.

David Duke was born in Vancouver and studied musicology at UBC, the University of North Carolina, and the University of Victoria. He studied composition privately with Jean Coulthard and, at the Banff Centre, Violet Archer. His concert music has been performed by Jon Kimura Parker, Desmond Hoebig, and Stephen Isserlis, and by ensembles such as the Toledo Symphony, the Vancouver Cantata Singers, and the Circle Singers of Washington, D.C,. (who recorded his madrgials Lion, Tygers, and Bears). His Canticle for Strings was recently put on CD by the Vancouver Symphony. He has been composer in residence for the BC Boys' Choir, the Langley Community Music School, and Studea Musica. He has written and broadcast extensively about Canadian music and composers, most recently a biography of Jean Coulthard with co-author William Bruneau. He was head of the School of Music at Vancouver Community College until early 2004. Mr. Duke will be presenting a session on women composers and how to introduce their music into our teaching studios.



SHAMMA SABIR

Shamma Sabir will enlighten us on the psychology of this complex art in which we are engaged.

Shamma Sabir has been a passionate ambassador of Canadian fiddle music from the time she heard her first notes. From the stage at the Canadian Grand Masters Fiddle Championships to the springy dance floors of Saskatchewan, Shamma has played and taught her way through much of the Canadian landscape. A devoted teacher, Shamma earned a Masters degree in Clinical Psychology using original research to further her understanding of the dance between music training and brain development. Shamma brings research about learning and the brain, years of experience as a teacher and her love of the power of curiosity and play to her sessions at Sound Vision.







RENA SHARON

Rena Sharon will bring insights into the extensive values of collaborative music-making.

Rena Sharon, pianist, has been called "one of the finest musicians of her generation" and a "national treasure." Among Canada's foremost chamber musicians, her performance spectrum also comprises solo recitals and concerti. Currently the Professor of Collaborative Piano Studies at the University of British Columbia, she is a recipient of the Dean of Arts Award for teaching, research, and community outreach. Ms. Sharon is well-known to CBC radio audiences, and has recorded for Marquis, Finlandia, Atma, Brava, Summit, Sono, CBC-500, and Boston Records.





HEATHER WALKER

Heather Walker will bring awareness to the role of Alexander Technique in our musical lives.

Two of Heather Walker's passions in life are the Alexander Technique and music. She has been playing French horn since the age of ten. It's a personal and artistic challenge for her, and a great deal of fun. However, at one point the years of intense music studies led to some very challenging problems; repetitive strain injuries, tension problems, and overuse. After trying every conceivable form of treatment, she discovered the Alexander Technique, a method that taught her to "unlearn" her habits of inefficient movement and thought.





Looking forward to what 2023 brings.



In January, the decision was made to have our spring music and dance festival on-line. Members struggled with the pros and cons of live vs virtual recitals and in the end, we decided to error on the side of safety. February was our annual general meeting. The rigors of the pandemic and complexity of virtual events meant that we suspended our annual North Fraser Music Festival this spring. We look forward to returning to a live event in 2023.

Our Treasurer, Marian Van Hove, retired and we welcomed Stephanie Forster into the role.

With the war in Ukraine on our minds, Greg Hartley created 2 different level arrangements of the Ukrainian National anthem for our students and Amber Tarling hosted a fundraising recital with her students and guest musicians to send over \$2000.00 to Ukraine for support.

In January we voted to allocate funds raised through MusicShare to the Music Department of Indigenous Education in District 43 (Coquitlam). In September the department received

the 295.00 raised for their 2022 - 2023 school year. MusicShare is students hosting their own home recitals, collecting donations and thereby supporting music studies for other students. The previous 2020 - 2021 recipients, District 43 Music Department, put the funds raised from the last 2 years to good use in 2022 supporting instrument rental and supplies for classroom teachers such as large Rubbermaid garbage cans for Taiko drumming! The District band studies were on hold due to COVID so teachers had to be very creative.

November 27th saw us host our Canada Music Week[®] Recitals in person again under the direction of Karen Wood and her team. CFMTA invited Karen Wood and Ingrid Fast to present how technology can be used at a CMW event and we incuded Zoom transmission for extra audience numbers. Students also enjoyed the addition of a vocal selection and piano trio presented by students, as well as a gift bag for performers.

A survey was prepared by Dr. Meijane Quong and Amber Tarling with 39% of the branch responding. This has given us some useful insight to understanding what is important to our members and what suggestions can be acted upon in the future.

We became aware that we need to draft bylaws for our branch and will do so in 2023.

Nineteen students performed mostly Canadian pieces plus a few other selections. They also displayed lively technical finesse with crossed-hands and eyes-closed playing, 3-4-5 chromatic scales, and other feats on the keyboard. In our hub city of Cranbrook, the traditional CMW student recital was revived on Sunday, November 27 at First Baptist Church, with twenty students giving an all-Canadian program. At both events, flags and other national symbols were on abundant display - and some student played their own works. The emcees shared facts and 'factoids' about the music offered. For instance: *O Canada* composer Calixa Lavallée has a piano work, *The Butterfly*, in Royal Conservatory ARCT List F. Our anthem's English lyrics are often revised, but the French words are unchanged since Day One. (First sung in 1880, *O Canada* became our true National Anthem only in 1980!) The emcees also told of Canadian contributions to the world such as the walkie-talkie, the paint roller, life-saving insulin for diabetics, the snowmobile, and the electric wheelchair. At end of the Cranbrook concert, awards were given to students earning highest marks in practical and theory exams.

We continue to offer our members professional development opportunities via our monthly workshops. This year, we were able to offer diverse topics such as:

Our branch provided several performance opportunities for our students. We held our Celebration of Excellence recitals in March to celebrate students' exam achievement of 90% and above; a virtual Spring Recital in May with close to 40 participating students, and finally three in-person Winter recitals in December with over 80 students coming out to perform for family and friends.

It very exciting this year to creation a new Chamber Music Program for our students! The goal of this program is for string students to meet and have fun playing music together and learning chamber music skills in a joyful, positive environment. The Broccherini Trio - formed by two violinists and one cellist, was born this fall! Coached by member, Margitta Krebs, this trio met over a 10-week period and made their debut at the December Winter Student Recital. The Trio's performance was very well received. It is our hope that this program will continue and expand further in the following year.

The two annual music festivals were a great success: the Student Performers' Guild (SPG) Festival and the Canada Music Week® (CMW) Festival. The SPG Festival in February took place in a virtual format, 163 students submitted videos and received written adjudications. The adjudicators were Thomas Green of Ontario, Jean Brown of Port Moody, BC and Dr. Libby Yu of Richmond, BC. The CMW Festival in November was a two-day event with Michèle Wheatley-Brown of Alberta as the adjudicator. Both festivals provided certificates and scholarships to students, as well as gift cards generously donated by Tom Lee Music Ltd.

In April, we held an audition to choose our branch's representative at the September BC Piano Competition. Rachel Wei went on to represent our branch and placed 3rd at the competition.

The biggest event for our branch this year was our Centennial celebration. On May 15, 2022, we celebrated our 100th anniversary with current members of the Vancouver/Burnaby branch along with former colleagues and guests gathered in the Ballroom of the Italian Cultural Centre to remember our past and to celebrate our future. Tasty hors d'oeuvre were served and entertainment was provided in recorded performances by the students of our branch members. Throughout the event, prizes were drawn. Our sponsors, Long & McQuade and Tom Lee Music Ltd., were both very generous in their contributions to the Centennial Celebration. We had the Wall of History detailing many of the Branch highlights over the past 100 years. 

For many years, even well into her 80s, she was a regular guest performer at my student year end recitals. My students loved to hear her perform and I think she enjoyed it too.

Paul Crawford, who was once a member of our branch, wrote in our branch historical record book in 2007 the following about Elizabeth –

Elizabeth Lewis was born in Calgary in 1928 into a family that strongly encouraged her musical aspirations. Her first piano teacher was Sue Blow of Calgary. After moving to Warfield in 1950, she continued her piano studies with Edith Anthony and later with Helen Dahlstrom . She obtained her associate degree in 1953 and remained an active teacher and member of the registered music teachers' association until 2000, serving the Trail/Castlegar branch in many different capacities, including President (1968-1969) and (1987-1992) and branch historian (compiling historical information in 1982-83 and 1996)

When asked to describe a professional highlight in her career, she described the many inspiring master classes given between 1956 to 1973 by Boris Roubakine. She noted how these regular sessions with a master pianist allowed teachers who participated in them to grow not only individually as musicians but also as a group of dedicated teachers who loved what they did and loved being and working together. For her, the registered music teachers in the Trail/Castlegar area formed an outstanding group of friendly, cooperative individuals, and being part of it provided a memorable experience of "belonging to something beyond oneself"
